"Private Ward was a model soldier. His ready smile and kind word to all showed the sterling character that was loved by so many. He always completed any given task in a most efficient manner and his loyalty and courage were beyond question."

#### John McEveety, '32

The following is a letter received by the mother of Lieut. John McEveety, '32 upon the occasion of her son's death. It was written by John's chap-

lain, Capt. J. T. Byrne. The letter reads:

"May I take this opportunity of extending to you my sincere sympathy on the occasion of the recent loss of your son, Lt. John McEveety. . . . In your grief over his loss you may well be proud of his deeds. He was called upon to make the supreme sacrifice and he gave generously, a true soldier of Christ and his country. 'Greater love than this no man hath than that he lay down his life for his friend.'

"It was my privilege as Catholic Chaplain of this Division Artillery for the past two years to have shared his friendship and to have known him rather intimately. On all occasions he was an outstanding officer but above all a representative Catholic. His influence in his organization was a great help to me in my efforts and his constant example of Catholic manhood was an example to those whom he served so well. Few chaplains have been blessed as I was with so worthy and fine a fellow-worker. I speak in glowing terms because I feel constrained to acknowledge my debt to him.

"May God give him a soldier's crown and eternal rest. And may Our Blessed Mother, the Mother of Sorrow, sustain you in this hour of sorrow and lighten the weight of the cross that has been so suddenly thrust upon you."

#### Walter Hanrahan, '42

The following is a letter of explanation on the death of Walter Hanrahan, '42 from the Chaplain of Lakeland Army Air Forces Base, Florida. The Reverend Daniel G. O'Brien, C.S.S.R., attended Walter "Tim" Hanrahan during his illness and at his death. The letter reads:

"Tim, as he was called by the family, or Mike to most of his friends, was an excellent patient while he was here. He was very popular here, as he had been at Regis, and was one of the top men in his class, in fact the day before he died, his class graduated and he took quite a few of the honors. He also had received an appointment to West Point and was to go to Ft. Benning the day after the accident happened. He had all the

makings of a fine young man and a good Catholic.

"The first time I saw Tim was Sunday afternoon March 5th. I had just wandered over to the hospital to kill a little time before getting ready for my evening Mass and they told me that Tim had just been brought in from a swimming accident with a broken neck. After talking to the doctor and finding out that there was no immediate danger, but that he was not expected to live, I went in and talked to Tim while they were getting ready in the operating room to do the little that could be done for him. I heard his confession then and told him I would bring him Communion the next morning. I saw him again that evening and he was fairly comfortable and resigned to a long siege in bed and giving up his career in the Army, but he had no doubts then that he was going to pull through. He talked of going back to school after a year or so when he would be able to get around. I didn't disabuse him, for I knew that he would need all the fight he could muster.

"The following morning I brought him Communion and told him I thought it would be a good idea if I gave him the rest of the Last Sacraments. That surprised him and he asked if it was that serious, so I explained that a broken neck was always serious and that I would feel better and so would he knowing that he had received the Last Sacraments, although giving those Sacraments didn't necessarily mean a fellow was going to die. He smiled and said, O.K. Father, go ahead, and received Communion and Extreme Unction devoutly. Several times after that I brought him Communion, and each time he was devout and grateful. I wouldn't say there was anything extraordinary about him, but he was a fine example of what ordinary everyday virtue and Catholicity means. From the 5th to the 22nd when he died there was never a complaint from him. He asked for help often—he had to for he was helpless himself—but it was always with courtesy, and he often mentioned how
