



"Grandma Julia" Honored with Deo et Patriae Award

On Tuesday, November 9, Mrs. Julia Stanzione GP'00 was honored with the 2021 Deo et Patriae Award. Affectionately known as "Grandma Julia," she was recognized in front of family, alumni, and friends of Regis for her 25 years of devoted service to the Hearn Speech and Debate Society and the entire school.

Returning in-person after being held virtually in 2020, the 2021 Deo et Patriae Reception and Celebration took place at the New York Athletic Club to cheers and laughter for all who attended. Following food and drinks, the evening's formal programming began with a singing of the Regis alma mater led by current seniors. After opening remarks from Vice President for Development James L. Kennedy '02 and a prayer from Principal Fr. Anthony D. Andreassi, CO, Eric DiMichele, the Director of Admissions and longtime moderator of the Hearn, introduced Grandma Julia as this year's honoree.

"No one is more tenacious, disciplined, organized, passionate, and loving than Grandma Julia. The success of the Hearn—and, be clear about this is directly attributable to her extraordinary efforts over the last 26 years, especially so over the last two years of this rather grim pandemic, where she's been downright heroic," DiMichele said. "You know, in a world of doubt, equivocation, polarization, depression, and moral collapse, there is one constant, and that is you, Grandma Julia."

Grandma Julia's contributions to Regis began in 1996, when her grandson Richard Rivero '00 asked if she would be able to volunteer some time to support the Hearn. Very soon, Grandma Julia assumed a leading role, recruiting volunteer judges, overseeing logistics, and attending weekend tournaments. She continued to do this gracious work for 25 years, often volunteering for Regis up to 30 hours per week, all while working as an administrator for a tutoring service. Grandma Julia has supported the successful running of over 1,100 speech and debate tournaments, and outside the Hearn has offered her assistance yearly to Regis' Open House, Interview Day, and other important events.

Before concluding remarks from Interim President Christian Talbot '93, Grandma Julia took to the stage to accept her award. "I'm overcome, so emotionally overcome by the outpouring of love I feel in this room, and from the bottom of my heart, believe me, it is sincerely reciprocated, much, much more than you will ever imagine," Grandma Julia said. "This is a night that will remain indelible in my mind and in my heart, so along with my love, and warmest hugs, I thank you a gazillion times over for this incredible honor."

First held in 1981, the Deo et Patriae Reception & Celebration recognizes generous supporters of Regis High School who have given to the Annual Fund at the Order of the Owl level or greater during the previous fiscal year. The night's award is presented to a person who has served Regis and the community in a distinguished capacity during the course of their life. Grandma Julia becomes the third woman in Regis history to earn the

"And, I don't think it's an exaggeration to say that if you know Julia, you have been part of a long line of people whose lives she has changed one smile and one conversation at a time, over many, many, many years."

IGNATIAN SPIRITUALITY The Fourth Day

A LIFE OF **CHRISTIAN PIETY**

Scott Moringiello '97 remembers friend and fellow Regian Gerald Russello '89, who passed away in November. This article originally appeared in Commonweal Magazine.

"Gerald Russello." "Hi, Jerry, it's Scott." "Scott! Great to hear from you. How is everything?"

That's how most of our phone conversations began. I was one of the people in Jerry Russello's life who knew him as Jerry, the guy from Regis—not Gerald, the well-respected securities lawyer, the editor of the *University Bookman*, the writer whose prose graced many and various publications.

I must have been fifteen when I met Jerry. Along with some Regis classmates, I had started a Catholic reading group under the tutelage of the great John L. Connelly '56, a legendary teacher who formed the lives of countless Regians, from Fr. Robert Imbelli '56 (his classmate) to novelist Phil Klay '01. With the kind of braggadocio not uncommon among Regis students, we fancied ourselves Catholic intellectuals, and asked Mr. Connelly if there were any heirs today to the authors we were reading. Who was engaged in writing about and therefore preserving a compelling vision of the Catholic

intellectual tradition and Catholic culture? Mr. Connelly told us that we'd get to meet such a person the following week at our regular meeting time-8:00 am on Wednesdays, an hour before classes began—when we gathered to discuss Evelyn Waugh and Etienne Gilson and John Paul II and all the rest.

Twenty-seven years later I still have a vivid memory of Jerry walking through Mr. Connelly's classroom door in his suit, holding his briefcase, thanking Mr. Connelly for inviting him, and assuring him that he was in no rush—the judge he was clerking for knew he'd be coming in closer to 9:30 than 9:00. (With all he did, was Jerry ever in a rush? Did he ever not have time for you?) I confess that I don't remember much more about that day, but I know that we asked Jerry how he got started as a writer. His advice was simple: writing and exploring ideas should be exciting. Send something to a magazine and see what happens. You'll probably get rejected, but you'll also probably learn something. Do this again and again, reading as much as you can along the way, until you get published.

That first encounter with Jerry made a lasting impression on me. We all need role models, and that day I found one of mine. But if Jerry had just been someone who dispensed good advice, I don't think there would have been such an outpouring of grief and so many beautiful tributes after his death. Jerry's life was much more attractive than that.

On the facade of Regis there is an inscription that reads Deo et Patriae Pietas Christiana Erexit: Christian piety built this for God and country. During both of our times at Regis, Jerry and

I heard a great deal about our charge to become "men for others," a goal that Fr. Pedro Arrupe, SJ, the former Superior General of the Society of Jesus, set out for all graduates of Jesuit schools. Jerry took those words to heart. He truly lived a life of service to others, in service to God and to his country.

Jerry's greatest gift to me, though, was the way he embodied pietas Christiana—Christian piety. "Piety," unfortunately, often calls to mind images of "simple" believers or uncritical religious naiveté. But piety is really an approach to life, a virtue that practices being grateful. It reminds us that we ought to be thankful to God for our country, for our family, for our friends-even for our high school. That gratitude, in turn, shapes our encounters with those around us. True piety doesn't have time for grudges; instead, like the agape for which it is most grateful, true piety "bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things" (1 Cor. 13:7). True piety never draws attention to itself, and Jerry certainly never drew attention to himself. Those who knew where to look, however, could see the piety with which he approached education, ideas, family, and God



Jerry would be quick to tell you that piety was a Roman virtue as much as a Christian one. He learned about piety from the Aeneid and from the Bible. And he was always learning. A few years ago, six or so of us got together for dinner with Mr. Connelly, as we did about once a year. One friend had just completed a doctorate on Spinoza, another had completed a residency in psychiatry, a third was working in consulting. As we went around the table updating each other about our lives, Jerry, typically, asked the most questions. He had a knack for

being genuinely curious and genuinely affirming. He was proud of all of us, in the way an older brother looks with pride on his younger brothers' accomplishments.

Jerry supported Regis and other educational endeavors because he believed they were places where students could ask enduring questions and cultivate abiding friendships. This is also what he saw in the Russell Kirk Center, the Intercollegiate Studies Institute, and the Lumen Christi Institute. His education—after Regis, he received a degree in Classics from Georgetown and graduated from NYU's law school-taught him what was worth studying, and his piety reminded him he didn't have all the answers. Jerry deeply believed that ancient Greek and Latin texts could help us encounter the permanent things, but he didn't love them just because they stood as a bulwark against the latest educational fad; he loved them because of the joy he found in getting together with friends—as we did—to read them.

Most people knew Jerry through his careers as an attorney and as the editor of the *University Bookman*. I can't speak to the 12 REGIS HIGH SCHOOL ANNUAL REPORT 2021 13

intricacies of his work as a lawyer (I'm blissfully ignorant of securities law), but I can attest to the way he brought his piety to legal questions. Even in the rarified world of corporate law, Jerry always had an eye on what specific laws meant to people's lives, and how the practice of law affected lawyers themselves. His legal practice was important, but it was not the most important part of his life. He understood that, while laws could help bring order to people's lives, the goal of life wasn't order. The goal of life was love.

The kinds of thinkers Jerry admired displayed the same kind of piety in their writing that he exemplified in his life. Orestes Brownson, Christopher Dawson, Russell Kirk, and Roger Scruton could all be classified as "conservative" thinkers, but Jerry wasn't interested in their labels. He saw them as writers who took serious questions seriously. They were concerned about what human beings owed each other and how history and culture shape us. Jerry edited a book of Dawson's writings (Christianity and European Culture) and wrote an excellent book on Russell Kirk (The Postmodern Imagination of Russell Kirk). In those books, Jerry showed that these two thinkers were still vital for understanding contemporary life. He also wrote introductions for reissued texts of Brownson and Dawson. All these writers remained essential because they raised the most important question: How can we be faithful? Or rather, how can we be pious? They didn't answer this or any other question for you, nor would Jerry presume to do that. But they offered models, pictures of what a life well-lived looked like.

I honestly don't know how Jerry kept up with editing the *University Bookman*, published by the Russell Kirk Center. Every week, a new essay would appear reviewing a book about history or politics or culture. Jerry was always actively seeking out new reviewers, and he had a special gift for nurturing young writers. He had a light touch with his editing, and he always made your work better, often in ways that you couldn't quite foresee. Most importantly, though, working with Jerry was fun. It was clear that he enjoyed editorial work, but more than that he enjoyed the friendships that came with editing the *Bookman*. Under the @ubookman handle on Twitter, Jerry brought these qualities with him to the usually depressing world of social media. Even there, he managed to show his bonhomie, and he never failed to see the best in others and engage in actual conversations.

Part of what drew Jerry to Russell Kirk, I'm certain, was Kirk's piety toward place. Jerry had a wonderfully expansive notion of community, and the republic of letters of which Jerry was such an active citizen knew no physical boundaries. Jerry would want to remind us, however, not to forget that we are individuals from particular families who grew up in specific places. Like Jerry, I'm an Italian-American kid from Brooklyn (although my mom's family is Irish, and we moved to Long Island when I was six). Perhaps Jerry's most important lesson to me was that our grandparents their traditions, their love of family, and yes, their piety possessed a wisdom that our fancy degrees and "connections" could only hope to emulate. Our educations were valuable insofar as they helped us deepen our love for where we came from and for those who raised us. Sure, Washington D.C. or Oxford or Chicago or Wall Street are great. Have you ever visited Mill Basin or Bay Ridge in Brooklyn, though? You can read about filial piety when you read about Aeneas carrying Anchises, but you can actually experience it every Sunday over dinner at your grandparents while watching the Mets. These places and these people opened up our worlds. Our task was to share what we learned. I just wish I had more time to learn from Jerry.

I especially wish I had more time to learn about parenting from Jerry. He was always interested to know about my students because he always wanted to learn what sorts of questions his own children might raise. He cared deeply about passing on the faith to them. I loved getting updates on their lives, and Jerry relished his role as a father. In my sadness hearing about his death, I was heartened to know that when he died, he was surrounded by his beloved wife, his children, and his sister.

Each morning at prayer, I recite a litany of family and friends who have died. Jerry, of course, is now part of that somber list. As I say his name, I don't worry that Jerry needs to be freed from the temporary torments of purgatory. (I'm sure Dante has already Vergiled this son of Mill Basin up that particular mountain.) Instead, in mentioning Jerry I ask God to allow me to practice the piety that Jerry lived because I want to be conformed to the Love that Jerry now encounters. *Oremus pro invicem*, my friend, that I may see you again.

Rev. Christopher J. Devron, SJ, Named 25th President of Regis High School

The Regis High School Board of Trustees on Tuesday, January 25, 2022 unanimously voted to appoint Rev. Christopher J. Devron, SJ, as the next president of Regis High School. Following a national search that attracted a wide range of qualified and experienced candidates, and a rigorous process that included input from hundreds of members of the Regis community, the school's presidential search committee enthusiastically recommended Fr. Devron, who will begin his term as the 25th President in the school's proud history in the summer of 2022.

"We are so pleased to welcome Fr. Devron back to Regis as the school's next president," said Marty Mannion '77, who chaired the presidential search committee and announced the news of Fr. Devron's appointment in a joint letter to the Regis community with Board Chair Tony DiNovi '80. "He brings nine years of directly relevant experience as the president of Fordham Prep, which gives him familiarity with Regis' opportunities and challenges. As the founding director of the REACH Program, Fr. Devron also has strong connectivity to Regis and our mission as well as outstanding pastoral leadership skills."

Fr. Devron brings with him 16 years of highly successful experience shepherding Jesuit high schools. He is currently in his ninth year as President of Fordham Preparatory School, where he has overseen a period of dynamic growth. Prior to Fordham Prep, Fr. Devron was the founding

president of Christ the King Jesuit College Prep, a Cristo Rey high school on the West Side of Chicago focused on providing a quality Catholic education for families that otherwise could not afford private school.

Of course, Fr. Devron already is well known and highly respected within the Regis community. In addition to the vision and leadership he provided the REACH Program from 2001 through 2006, he also served as a valued friend and mentor to many students and faculty and staff members alike. In the years since, he has remained close with the school, serving on the Board of Trustees from 2014

"I am profoundly humbled and honored to be selected by the Regis board for this role. This is not simply because Regis holds an iconic status in the world of Jesuit education, which it does. Being selected as Regis' next president taps into a deep reservoir of cherished memories and vocational graces," Fr. Devron said. "In 2001, I came to Regis, in my first assignment as a lesuit priest, as a classroom teacher, campus minister, and founding director of the REACH program. I am thrilled to return to 84th street to serve this special community of students, faculty, administrators, and alumni."

Fr. Devron grew up in Palatine, Illinois and graduated in 1989 from the University of Notre Dame, where he majored in philosophy and government. He entered the Society of Jesus in



1991 and was ordained to the priesthood in 2001. Fr. Devron holds a Master's in Philosophy from Loyola University Chicago as well as a Master's in Divinity from the Weston Jesuit School of Theology. He also earned a Master's in Theology in African American spirituality through coursework at the Harvard Divinity School and the Institute for Black Catholic Studies at Xavier University in New Orleans.

"Arianna is an outstanding teacher," shared Chair of the Language Department Mr. David Bonagura '99. "Her classes are engaging and thorough. She constantly employs creative methods so her students can develop their language skills. And she regularly takes time to meet with students one-on-one to help them progress. Regis is blessed to have her as both a Chinese and Spanish teacher."

Huergo, who also teaches Spanish I and serves as a Junior advisor, received a formal letter of recognition announcing her receipt of the prestigious award. Additionally, Huergo was awarded several gifts, including a certificate, award plaque, UChicago shirt, and Staples gift card.

"I feel honored and definitely very happy," remarked Huergo on receiving the award. "It made me really see the big influence that we have in our students, how we can change their future. Teaching is a very rewarding career. Seeing your students succeed is seeing your own success."



Regis Honors Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.



On Wednesday, January 26, the Regis community participated in a prayer service celebrating the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Students, faculty, and staff reflected on the principles of the late civil rights leader, coming together to continue advocating for justice and a more accepting and loving society.

The service was held in the Chapel of the Sacred Heart and livestreamed for students to watch from their advisement locations. Following introductory remarks from Director of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Ms. Belkise Dallam, Dean Rosamilia '23 and George Cheung '23 led the community through an opening prayer and invitatory respectively. Alexander Cohen '24 and Charles Mango '25 then offered a scriptural reading from Exodus, which was reflected upon by Johnathan Bernadeau '23.

"I doubt many of us here believe that our actions could be as momentous as that of any legendary figure. Regardless, we are called to march that righteous path," said Bernadeau. "Our individual works are not meant to be seen as separate from God's greater plan. No matter how little we are able to see that, we march forward. It does not matter if you feel small. It does not matter if the situation seems unchangeable. We believe that as Catholics, as Regians, no matter what, we march."

After Bernadeau's remarks, Thomas Fuller '25 and Director of Mission and Identity Fr. James P. Ferus, SJ offered petitions, and Cohen and Dominick Facchini '24 led students through a reflection on the words and teachings of Dr. King. College Guidance Counselor Mr. Christopher Febles and Mango concluded the morning's service with closing thoughts and prayers.

"The path of the Noble Heart, the Man or Woman for Others, does indeed lead to a Promised Land, a world with justice for all, where our children and families are cared for, where we are safe and accepted for who we are," said Febles. "It's a wild, far-off, nearly impossible dream, I know. But hope, and the knowledge that I have my brothers and sisters with me, has kept me going this far. And I'll do my best to keep moving on that path, no matter the odds. And I ask you to be that supportive, hopeful, caring person we know you can be, the kind of person who can look a friend in the eye in his or her darkest hour and say, "I am with you."

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Regis Community "Braves the Shave" To Support Childhood Cancer Research

On Thursday, January 20, students, faculty, and staff "braved the shave" for the 12th Annual St. Baldrick's Day. Held virtually last year, the event brought the Regis community together in the auditorium to shave their heads and stand in solidarity with children impacted by cancer.

First conceptualized in 1999, The St. Baldrick's Foundation is a volunteer-driven charity focused on funding the research needed to cure childhood cancers and ensure these survivors can continue to live healthy lives. Around the world, roughly 300,000 children are diagnosed with cancer annually, and in the United States, children die of cancer more than any other disease.

As hair loss is a common side effect of cancer treatment, becoming a "shavee" offers one way of showing support for those suffering with the disease, and stands as a way of inspiring others to fund and support ongoing research.

St. Baldrick's Day at Regis is sponsored by Catalyst, Regis' Christian Service Club, and this year's event was organized by Sebastian Cardena '22, who has voluntarily shaved his head annually since his freshman year. The Regis community successfully raised \$24,000 for childhood cancer research. Those who "braved the shave," which included the entire Varsity Baseball team, were met with wide praise, and helped to spread continued awareness about the effects of childhood cancer.



Regians March for Life in Nation's Capital



On Friday, January 21, a contingent of 24 Regians and faculty traveled to Washington, D.C. to participate in the 49th annual March for Life. Accompanied by students from St. Vincent Ferrer High School and the Convent of the Sacred Heart, the group joined 150,000 others to advocate for the right to life for all human beings.

Prior to departing to the nation's capital, the group celebrated Mass at Regis with History teacher Fr. Arthur C. Bender, SJ '67. Once in D.C, students heard from a variety of speakers, later marching down Constitution Avenue to the Supreme Court building. While it was only 25° F, everyone remained warm

and cheerful, filled with enthusiasm in their common witness in defense of the most vulnerable.

"Though we are there to protest an injustice, the positive energy of the marchers, some of whom sing and play music along the route, reminds everyone that all life is to be cherished and celebrated," said Mr. David Bonagura '99, Chair of the Language Department and Moderator of Amate Vitam, Regis' pro-life club. Ms. Consuelo Tate of the Language Department and Ms. Teresa Moriarty of the English Department also joined the group of Regians on the trip.

Regis Delegation Attends 2021 Ignatian Family Teach-In for Justice



On Friday, November 5, Regis High School sent a delegation of students, faculty, staff, and alumni to Washington, DC. to participate in the 2021 Ignatian Family Teach-In for Justice. Organized by the Ignatian Solidarity Network and grounded in the Jesuit faith and tradition, the three-day conference brought together high school and college students, church leaders, and educators from across the Jesuit network to reflect on pertinent social justice issues and discuss opportunities to create a more just world.

The first in-person gathering since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, this year's conference brought together over 1,000 attendees from around the world to engage in important dialogues around faith, advocacy, and solidarity. Regis' delegation, led by Campus Ministry and the Heritage Club, was the largest in attendance, composed of 23 sophomores, juniors, and seniors, four faculty and staff, and five alumni.

The theme of this year's Ignatian Family Teach-In for Justice was "Imagining a Path Forward: Reflection. Reckoning. Kinship." Through a series of panel discussions and small group sessions, the conference challenged attendees to reflect on the devastating impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and the crises it exacerbated, reckon with the responsibility had as Catholics to promote change, and develop a deeper kinship with vulnerable populations so that all can flourish in God's Kingdom.

"It felt amazing to return to IFTJ after last attending in-person in 2019," said Director of Social Justice Initiatives Mr. Marselys Lucero. "Students were able to listen to a variety of speakers on different topics and issues, tapping into interests and passions. The hope is that students will become more engaged and involved in these issues as they continue their studies at Regis and transition into their collegiate and professional careers."

Several civic, educational, and religious leaders guided the weekend-long event, including author Fr. James Martin, SJ, Executive Director of U.S. Climate Action Network Keya Chatterjee, racial justice scholar Fr. Bryan Massingale, and Founder of Homeboy Industries Fr. Greg Boyle, SJ. Additionally, students Sebastian Huerta '22 and Brian Mhando '22 had the opportunity to speak at the conference, presenting on the importance of having intergenerational conversations around issues of race, identity, and equity.

"Being able to attend IFTJ after a year of remote school and a lack of school events was a great experience," said Huerta. "As a presenter and a participant, I was able to engage with key issues of social justice outside of school, with people from around the country. Even apart from that, the experience was fun, and I got to know people from the Regis community better."

Regians Organize Rikers Island Supply Drive

During the month of October, Regians Will Liao '22 and Francesco Agnello '24, along with the support of Director of Social Justice Initiatives Mr. Marselys Lucero, organized a schoolwide supply drive for formerly incarcerated individuals pursuing higher education. Previously detained at Rikers Island, the scholars now reside at the Ignacio House of Studies in the Bronx, and the drive helped provide much needed clothing, toiletries, and food to these students as they continue their scholastic pursuits.

When asked what motivated him to pursue the supply drive at Regis, Liao reflected on his close experiences with people impacted by the prison system. "My friend Dante spent $3\frac{1}{2}$ years in Attica for gun possession – but this isn't the only thing that defines him. He's also a regular customer at

my parents' health food store, a son, a dad, and the person who taught me everything I know about protein supplements since he's an avid weightlifter like me," shared Liao. "The residents of Ignacio House likewise aren't defined solely by why they went to jail but also by their goals and dreams as returning citizens."

The Ignacio House of Studies is overseen by Thrive for Life, a non-profit organization providing educational, professional, and spiritual resources to incarcerated and formerly incarcerated persons in New York and New Jersey. Guided by the Jesuit tradition and the Universal Apostolic Preference of "Walking with the Excluded," Thrive for Life is rooted in creating a network of support for those at the margins of society, easing their transitions out

of prison and giving them the tools needed to find success and independence.

"Student leadership and empowerment is one of the goals of Campus Ministry, so I was thrilled that Will and Francesco took over this initiative," said Lucero. "Not only were Will and Francesco instrumental, but another Regian, alum Vincenzo Guido '16, has been involved with Thrive for Life for the past few years and brought the potential of a supply drive to my attention. I think all three of them are a testament to what we expect at Regis, both while attending and after graduation."

Regis's partnership with and service to Rikers Island has extended beyond this year's supply drive. Five years ago, Principal Fr. Anthony D. Andreassi, CO 18 REGIS HIGH SCHOOL ANNUAL REPORT 2021 19

formed Regis at Rikers, which prior to the pandemic brought Regis juniors and seniors annually to the prison to meet with inmates. Students over the years have been able to participate in conversations and competitive sports at Rikers, allowing them to develop solidarity with the incarcerated and begin advocating for just reforms to the prison system.

"I led this drive in hopes that it will ultimately lead to a supperbook club where the Ignacio and Regis communities can exchange stories," said Liao. "Dante reinforced a key lesson Regis taught me – we become better people when we listen to everyone with an open mind."



Alumni Share Work and Life Advice With Seniors on Career Day

On Wednesday, October 13, Regis invited alumni from a variety of industries to participate in the school's annual Career Day with the Senior class. Conducted over Zoom, the program offered students the opportunity to discern their career interests and learn valuable advice from leaders across their respective fields.

The morning's events commenced with a keynote address delivered by Michael Moro '96, CEO of Genesis, a leader in institutional digital asset markets. "Life is hard out there. And things won't just be handed to you; you will have to work for what you want. But what you will all have is the phenomenal foundation that is Regis," said Moro. "It may not be apparent to you now, but I truly believe that the gift that is this school will continue to pay dividends for the rest of your lives, oftentimes in unexpected moments. I look forward to your continued success, and the contributions that you will all be making down the road."

Of course, each uniquely reflected the love and admiration held for her. But what most impressed me was the pastor quoting Mike as saying, 'Mary Anne never met a person she didn't change.' Such a perfect sumup of a person's life!" **Ed Kelly** is moving: "With a bit of sadness and a wisp of nostalgia, but with fond memories and high expectations, Kathy and I will be moving to Shepherdstown, W. Va., in mid-November. I have lived in D.C. and Alexandria since January 1972. In 2014, we had purchased what was intended as our retirement home. We will be moving from a twobedroom house to a four-bedroom on a lot more than twice the size of our current one. Many of you know the importance of classical music to Kathy and myself. We hope to find a mix of classical music performances in the Shepherdstown area. I currently serve on the Board of a northern Virginia regional musical organization that provides five or six concerts a season. I also serve on the Board of the Friends

When I remarried after Mary's death, I moved from the Jesuit Holy Trinity Church in Georgetown to Blessed Sacrament in Alexandria. I will miss the Men's Group there with its speakers and smallgroup discussions. Kathy and I will mostly miss the weekly Bible Study Group, taught by a brilliant theologian, Fr. Mark Carrier, who knows Latin, Greek, Hebrew, as well as some Aramaic, and who provides background and context of a particular reading, including pointing out mistranslations that can change the meaning of some passages." Harry De Maio happily reports: "Got our Pfizer booster shots. The Octavius epic moves on. Book 15 will be released in November. Books 16 and 17 are due out early 2022. Sherlock Holmes and the Glamorous Ghost comes out this December." John Amabile writes: "In the Summer Prowlings, I came across an entry by **Paula Neira '81**. Paula may be the first woman to graduate from Regis. She then graduated from the Naval Academy and, sometime later recognized that her gender did not align with the gender that she was assigned at birth. As a transgender person, she has been extraordinarily successful in her chosen professions (Navy, nurse, lawyer), to the extent that the Secretary of the Navy has made her a co-sponsor (together with a U.S. senator) of an about-to-be christened ship." Jack Magan remembers: "In 1965, I joined ABC Television in sports sales, and was having lunch at Toots Shor's with Rocky Marciano, a decade retired as World Heavyweight Champion. Suddenly he uttered, 'Oh, [expletive]! There's Frank Costello. He'll want to meet with me.' Two minutes later, the maître d'approached our table. 'Mr. Marciano, Mr. Costello would like to see you, if you would.' Rocky emitted another 'Oh, [expletive]!' He felt everyone in the place would think he and Costello were in cahoots. I recommended, 'Hustle over there and show him the deference he's due as America's most notorious killer.' Rocky failed to see my humor, but visited with the Mafia chieftain, and was back, greatly relieved. All Costello wanted to do

was thank him for what he'd done throughout

his career for the image of Italian-Americans. During the meal, when I asked about the most unusual thing that ever happened to him during a fight, I was rattled by Marciano's response: During his 1953 Roland La Starza fight at the Polo Grounds, as he was breaking the blood vessels in La Starza's arms in a barbaric assault that sports fans still talk about, he heard a female Italian-accented voice at ringside, bellowing, 'An-iii-mal! An-iii-mal!' When he glanced down, he was startled to see his mother, who had never before attended one of his fights—and would never attend another." October 3, 2021 was the 70th anniversary of the famous "Shot Heard Round the World" (viz. Emerson's "Concord Hymn" and DeLillo's Underworld), Bobby Thomson's home run. Here are some vivid memories from 10/3/51. **John Donohue**: "I left school and took the subway to the Westchester Square station. Walking down the stairs to the street, I heard a roar of voices. Bobby Thomson had hit his miracle home run, and I had missed it. But being a Bronx boy, I was a Yankees fan, and it did not hurt that much." Lee Sculti: "I was a Dodger fan, and my older sister, Margaret, had earlier dated Ralph Branca, so at our house, the most we felt was deep sympathy for Poor Ralph. Now I'm reading The Wright Brothers. There's a whole lot more to the story than we had time for in history class—a worthwhile read." Bill Sullivan: "We were in the old gym practicing with the basketball teams, when someone came in from the far end screaming that Thomson had just hit a home run. Although a Yankee fan, I was the only one in my neighborhood who was not a Dodger fan, so it was a great day." John Amabile: "I can still hear Russ Hodges's call, 'The Giants win the pennant!' The joy in my heart—God heard my prayers! Could it be that Leo was really being rewarded for being a 'nice' guy, despite all the contrary evidence? Had to be, for why else did the Deity intervene on his behalf? It was a wonderful experience, fondly remembered by all of us aged Baseball Giant fans these many decades later!" **Tom O'Toole:** "I don't recall where I was for the 'Shot.' But I have a clear and different memory of Bobby Thomson. After a

game at the Polo Grounds when I was maybe

12–13 years old, some of us waited outside for player autographs. Bobby Thomson emerged, probably new to the Giants, and was surrounded. He joked, saying he was not a famous player and why would we want his autograph. As he signed, he was not hurried and continued bantering with us. My recollection is of how very gracious and nice a guy he was." Al Kenneke: "I recall staying after school and gathering in the back area of the cafeteria at those stand-up green eating counters. Someone had brought a radio. We were roughly split between Giant and Dodger fans. Like the other Bums fans, I was devastated by that fateful Branca-Thomson moment. Years later, my kids loved to rib me by playing the recording of the Giants' announcer yelling over and over, 'The Giants win the pennant!'" **Bob** Maresca: "Being an avid Dodger fan, I stayed at Regis following some of the game until I had to get home to deliver my Brooklyn Eagle paper route, satisfied that the Dodgers were winning. But as I was transferring trains, I heard a loud roar and a warning to the Dodger fans not to jump on the tracks. It was a sad ride back home that day." **Bob Baron**: "On that special day, I got home by the 7th inning. My mother was ironing, and we listened to the radio together. We had no TV. When Bobby Thomason got his hit, we both screamed and danced around the room. Willie Mays was on deck but not needed. In the 1980s, I started collecting autographed baseballs, and I have one signed by both Ralph Branca and Bobby Thomson. I will bring it to our 70th anniversary next year." Larry Boland: "I was a Dodger fan, born in Flatbush, raised in the Bronx. I remember kneeling in front of our TV set, praying for the Bums in that final inning. Brooklyn seemed to be coasting to a playoff win, but we knew it's not over 'till the Fat Lady sings.' Those short-left field and right-field foul poles (279'/258') at the Polo Grounds could make a team 'lucky' at any time. Leo Durocher, then the Giants Manager, had famously said 'You take the good team and I'll take the lucky team.' Leo must have had a vision of Bobby Thomson stepping in again against Ralph Branca. Thomson had homered against Branca earlier in the week. Branca grooved a fastball, (Red Barber said it was a curve) and as soon as Thomson hit it, I thought of that short-left field wall. Gulp! The 'shot' fell into that close-in lower deck instead of Andy Pafko's glove. Oh well, wait

till next year!"

After completing her master's degree, Fran also worked for IBM and then moved to lona College, where she succeeded at both teaching and administration, becoming chairperson of the Computer Science department. She earned a doctorate from Columbia and was noted for her ability to get lona students internships and permanent employment at IBM and other prestigious companies. While at IBM, Ken aided in these efforts. In retirement, Ken taught CS at Iona with Fran. We have lost three more classmates: Greg Dixon, Bob Somma, and Bob Sullivan. Greg died on September 20th in Brooklyn. He had worked for Zim International Shipping Company for 34 years and at retirement was Vice President of the North Atlantic Region. He left his wife of 51 years, Maggie, and three sons. Bob Somma succumbed to Parkinson's disease a few days earlier. Wayne Merritt and I attended his large memorial service in Newburyport, MA, at which speakers discussed his prominent career as an attorney and judge. Some of us remembered Bob's prelegal career as founding editor of Fusion, one of a handful of rock magazines established around 1970. It "was distinguished by its mix of grad-school intellectualism and high-level satire," according to a 2020 New Yorker essay. Everyone emphasized Bob's remarkable athletic accomplishments as a swimmer and triathlete. His daughter Willamain noted Bob's willingness, even eagerness, to take risks, and all agreed that Bob was always ready for anything. It could be hard for lesser mortals to keep up. I will never forget one of my own visits to Bob's family home in Stony Brook, LI, in the summer of 1966, during which one of his cousins tried to teach me to water-ski in "the creek," a narrow, winding inlet of Smithtown Bay. The ensuing crash put me in the hospital for almost three weeks. A few days before Bob's service I had the good fortune to get together with **Frank Stella** for the first time in almost half a century. Frank and his wife have been living in Ireland for the last couple of years, but they were on a post-pandemic trip home to reconnect with family and to see a new grandchild for the first time. While they were in western Massachusetts Frank suggested we meet up in Worcester for an extended lunch. It was great to catch up with another former Fusion contributor. (We both deny blame for

the ultimate failure to win the competition with Rolling Stone). While in Worcester I was also able to track down Bob Sullivan, who was living there in retirement from the priesthood of the Archdiocese of Boston. (My day brought back memories of IF, where alphabetic seating had Somma, Spagnoli, Stella, and Sullivan lined up in the back half of row 2.) Bob never used email, and I hadn't seen him since a Boston-area Regis reunion at Wayne's house more than a decade ago. His health had clearly declined. He had lost a leg, but his main problem was anemia, which required increasingly frequent blood transfusions. In consultation with his doctor, last summer Bob decided to stop the treatment and go into hospice care, while continuing to live in his apartment with caretaking assistance. Despite his precarious health, we had a good conversation that inevitably included memories of experiences with Somma in the late 60s and early 70s when we were all living in Cambridge, MA. I talked to Bob again after the Somma memorial service – he had requested a report on it – but less than two weeks later Bob died himself, peacefully, still in his apartment with his caretakers. To move on to less somber news, still from the northeast (and 1F), Bob Sheehan wrote to recall the importance of Regis in the mobility of his father (class of '22) out of "his family's lowest middle class existence." This history has helped motivate Bob to join in **John** O'Rourke's assistance to Ken Gavin's work at Brooklyn Jesuit Prep, in addition to his long-time support of after-school programs and charter schools for impoverished kids in East Harlem and the South Bronx. Farther afield (though still in 1F), Allan Service reports from Colorado that "I finally finished and (self) published the book I have been working on for about three years. My Irish Journey(s) is part memoir and part love story about my many journeys with my wife Esther to the island of Ireland over the past twenty-five years." From southern California (and 1E), **Edward Ryan** wrote that he had recently survived "two nice earthquakes nearby (not unusual). The second was a little scary but only knocked my stuffed bear off his perch atop the TV. Also a thunderstorm (very unusual)." Edward is happy that he can once more view Notre Dame football in a sports bar, and, he adds, "I actually went to a movie (CODA). It's been too hot to venture much away from the coast, but some road travel as the weather cools

is planned." Speaking of weather, **Bill Gallaher**

(1B) wrote in mid-September that Louisiana was "still a third world country after Ida." He and his wife had evacuated (with difficulty) to join family in south Texas for eight days, but when they returned to their home just north of New Orleans they found significant roof damage. The roof was quickly patched up but may not be completely replaced for months, owing to the shortage of contractors and the scale of Ida's destruction. Bill continues to draw on his lifetime in virology to follow COVID closely, "trying to advise those around us and to protect our own lives," though he finds "the level of denial and resistance to common sense down here is really depressing. Even those who know of my long career don't listen to me, preferring instead some idiot on Fox News. Our class lost a great man, truly a man for others, **Dave Colangelo**, on September 12, 2021. We have heard from a number of

classmates, especially the Staten Island contingent, and those who knew Dave's heroic story. What follows is Dave's obituary, written by his brother, and some additional thoughts from his friend, **loe Loffredo**. For additional information on what made the last 47 years of his life so challenging, and how he met the challenge early on, please Google "A Triumph Over Adversity" and "Washington Post" to find their 1977 article. Obituary, edited from Legacy. com: "DAVID ANTHONY COLANGELO, 68, passed away at home on Sunday, September 12, 2021. David was born and raised on Staten Island, NY and graduated from Regis High School in 1970 and Columbia University in 1973. He then moved to Washington, DC to attend Georgetown University Law Center. Early in his second year of law school, he was shot in a robbery, instantly becoming paralyzed from the neck down. Determined to still become an attorney, he returned to Georgetown Law the following year, after a lengthy hospitalization involving multiple surgeries and physical rehabilitation. The Georgetown law community, family, and friends all assisted him in returning to school. David graduated in 1977, took the bar exam orally, and began his 37-year career with the National Labor Relations Board in the Division of Advice. The NLRB recognized that by granting David generous workplace accommodations necessitated by his quadriplegia, it was gaining an outstanding analytical attorney as well as a personable mentor to new attorneys he later supervised. Severely disabled for 47 years, David displayed extraordinary perseverance, thoughtfulness and acceptance. He had a gentle demeanor, a fierce determination, and profound gratitude to the family, friends, and medical professionals who enhanced the quality and length of his life. Dave is survived by his wife of 40 years, Dorothy Saunders, his sons Andrew (Lauren) and Stephen, his grandchildren, lack, Charlie, and Grace, his mother, Lorraine, his brothers, John (Margie) and Peter (Mary Anne), his sister Mary Ellen, and many nieces, nephews and extended family members. His father Anthony predeceased him." Joe Loffredo adds some personal reflections about our classmate: "Dave Colangelo was one of the Staten Island crew. We all met up every morning at our regular bench on the upper deck of the 7.30 ferry and spent the time studying together, mixed with

teen-age banter. My Dad's family knew Dave's

family, so **Lou Deasaro** would break into the theme from The Patty Duke Show when he saw us together. We were lab partners in Father Egan's Physics class in Senior Year, along with Rich Esposito. We had spirited experiments as we pondered the mysteries of gravity and centrifugal force. Dave quietly ascended into the top tier of RHS class rankings, earning him acceptance into Columbia. Since freshmen in 1970 could not stay in the dorms, Dave had another year of an even worse commute from Staten Island. We worked together at my Dad's company, Thomas Cook & Sons. One lunch hour we were together on Fifth Avenue in front of a store when our Selective Service lottery numbers were announced. We both got really lousy numbers, lower than 50. It was good for us to be together when we got the news. I got the news in the fall of 1974 of the shooting, and visited Dave at the Rusk Institute. It was devastating to see him in that condition, but even then I could see his commitment to recover to the best of his ability. We recently reconnected on LinkedIn, thanks to Tom

Quinlan. I drove down to St. Clare's in Staten Island a few weeks ago for the Memorial Mass. His sister delivered a moving tribute, revealing that he had chosen Ignatius as his confirmation name, and giving him credit for selecting such an unusual name, risking taunts from his classmates. I assured her afterwards that Dave was never taunted, probably due to him not really mentioning the name. But it did illustrate how natural it was that he would come to Regis. Dave was a smart guy, a good student, and a great friend. He helped me and the other Staten Islanders get through the four years, and survived for 47 years in a condition that few of us can imagine. Requiesce in pace, David."

After a six-year stretch in remission from lung cancer, Phil's cancer has returned and progressed. Phil believes his new meds and radiation will help put the illness back in remission. In the meantime, his family, friends and classmates can support Phil with prayers. Please keep Phil and family in your prayers." Jack Martin's son John married Nicole Grosjean in July. The married couple both work for Nielsen Media. Daughter Megan and her husband Mark are new parents of John Thomas "Jack" Bisanzo, born six weeks early at 4 pounds but doing fine. Little Jack is Jack and Maryann's first grandchild. Like the rest of us so privileged, I am confident they are loving it. And now for something completely different: Recently, as summer was ending, NY Knicks All-Star Julius Randle shot a commercial for Vroom in the Martin driveway. lack remains a busy retiree, having recently covered the Astros-White Sox Division Series, and making first-time trips for football games to Penn State's Beaver Stadium, and Green Bay's Lambeau Field. On October 21st, the Regis community lost Fr. Robert A. McGuire, 93, affectionately known as "Sweaty Bob." A Xavier grad who never held it against us, he helped many in our class find their way to the next stop

in their educational journeys. In particular, he herded 10, 11 or maybe 12 of us cats to LeMoyne College in Syracuse, New York. There, your scribe **Kevin Conboy** met Maureen during Freshman Orientation Week and the rest, as they say, is history. We are at 46 years and counting. Thank you, Sweaty Bob, and rest in peace. **Gerry McDermott** retired from the Anglican Chair at Beeson Divinity School in May 2020 and is now living with his wife lean in Charlottesville, VA. His two most recent books (out of more than twenty) were published in the last year: Race and Covenant, and Understanding the Jewish Roots of Christianity. 
