President's Report

Steady Progress



We recently had our fiveyear accreditation review by New York State Association of Independent Schools (NYSAIS). This is an interim review, the midpoint of the 10-year major visitation that all member schools have. It was an opportunity for us to give them a progress report on how well we were doing

in implementing the various recommendations that they made in their decennial visit back in the spring of 2015. We had a lot of good things to report in the four and a half years since they were last with us:

- Renovated all five science labs, improving life safety issues dramatically;
- Renovated the cafeteria;
- Renovated the locker room;
- Renovated the lecture hall;
- Renovated three classrooms as models for future renovations;
- Completed our first strategic plan;
- Completed a curriculum review that led to a new schedule that now includes a daily "Community Time" mid-morning;
- Grew the REACH Program by 50%;
- Established a better support system for REACH graduates at Regis and elsewhere;
- Set Annual Fund giving records in three of the last four years;
- Addressed health and safety concerns with the addition of a full-time nurse and two full-time security guards (paid for compliments of New York City); implemented card readers for attendance and fire drill safety;
- Introduced a new student information computer system:
- Added an additional college counselor;
- Provided more financial support for students who need assistance with everything from commuting to computers to lunch money.

It would be fair to say that the visiting team was impressed with what they saw, and while we do not have their final report yet – and there will be, of course, further recommendations for improvements – I am proud that Regis High School continues to improve year after year.

This edition of our magazine includes our Annual Report. We were able to accomplish so much in recent years because of the incredibly strong support that we receive from so many members of our community. Thank you! We would not be able to renovate this historic building, we would not be adding programs and personnel, and we would not be able to pay our talented and dedicated faculty at levels equal to other NYC private schools without the support that we continue to receive from alumni, parents, and friends of Regis High School.

While preparing for a visitation committee can be painful, and hosting the committee can be a little nerve wracking, it is also a time to see how far we have come in many important areas. Our strategic plan points to a number of places where we think we can continue to improve, so I'm confident that when it is time for our next NYSAIS visitation five years from now, we will have even more good news to report about what is happening on 84th Street. Thank you for helping to make that possible.

Be assured of my prayers for you and the entire Regis community.






Funding a Transformative Education

From 2014 to 2019, the Annual Fund nearly doubled in revenue — a testament to the remarkable generosity of our community. In the last three years, the Annual Fund has raised \$10 million more than it did in the previous three years. This momentum has enabled us to achieve our ambitious yet necessary annual income goals that help to cover operating expenses and keep Regis in the black despite being tuition-free. From our superior faculty to retreat programs and building upkeep, the Annual Fund fuels the daily life of the school.







Protecting the Endowment

Although Regis has never been fully endowed, the legacy of excellence initiated by the Founding Family has continued through the annual giving of our alumni, families, and friends. As a result of recent robust Annual Fund achievements, withdrawals from the endowment have remained a consistent and responsible 4%. As of this past June, the endowment had reached \$99.7 million. As we begin our 2020 Annual Fund, we must again meet our annual income needs in order to keep the endowment growing. A strong Annual Fund protces the school's endowment, and both sources of revenue are essential to the school's unique business model.

For the fourth year in a row, we achieved a net operating surplus, permitting a return to the endowment and funding for capital projects around the building.

For the fourth year in a row, the success of the Annual Fund not only helped us meet our budget but also permitted a return of funds to the endowment. At the cost of roughly \$25,000 per student, Regis educates young men at about half the cost of other private high schools in New York City.

Regis Bar Association Launches Hon. John F. Keenan '47 Lecture Series



The Regis Bar Association on September 25 launched its new Hon. John F. Keenan '47 Lecture Series with a fascinating discussion with Judge Keenan himself. Keenan, the legendary former prosecutor and longtime federal judge, returned to Regis and entertained roughly 100 alumni and friends with memories of the notable cases he has prosecuted and presided over.

Todd Cosenza '91, a partner at Willkie Farr & Gallagher, deftly moderated the conversation, which is the first in a new annual series that will feature distinguished lawyers from the Regis family. The series is fittingly named given Keenan's sterling legal career.

After graduating from Regis in 1947 and Manhattan College in 1951, Keenan earned a law degree from Fordham University in 1954. His law career was put on hold to join the U.S. Army, where he was assigned to the Army Security Agency and stationed in Tokyo from 1954 to 1956 during the Korean War. Soon after completing his service and after a four-month stint at a law firm — the only time he spent in private practice — Keenan found his way to the District Attorney's office, where he was appointed assistant district attorney in New York County. He later served as chief assistant under District Attorney Robert Morgenthau. While chief assistant, Keenan led the homicide bureau during its prosecutions of some of the most notable murder cases in New York City.

President Ronald Reagan appointed Keenan to the position of United States district judge for the Southern District of New York in 1983, a position he has held for 36 years. On May 19, 2016 at the Daniel Patrick Moynihan U.S. Courthouse at 500 Pearl Street, the 9th Floor Ceremonial Courtroom for the Southern District of New York was renamed the Hon. John F. Keenan Ceremonial Courtroom.

"It was an honor to have Judge Keenan back in the building, and to have him lead off this lecture series appropriately named after him," said Regis President Fr. Daniel K. Lahart, S.J. "His storied past, along with his sharp intellect and remarkable memory, made for a very enjoyable evening. I was touched as he concluded with a tribute to what Regis meant to him and to all the other Regians in the room. It reminds us of why we do what we do every day here on 84th Street."

In those closing remarks, Keenan spoke directly to Fr. Lahart and offered glowing praise for his alma mater.

"The education, Father, that you give to young men — to boys — it prepares them for life," Keenan said. "It teaches them how to think, how to express themselves. It's

Peter Labbat '83 P'23 Honored With 2019 Deo et Patriae Award



Former Regis High School Board of Trustees Chairman Peter Labbat '83 P'23 was honored with the Deo et Patriae Award on Wednesday, Nov. 6. Established in 1981, the annual award is presented to a person who has served Regis and the community in a distinguished capacity.

"I'm grateful to Pete for his intense love of Regis, for his extreme dedication to this place that all of us love," Regis President Rev. Daniel K. Lahart, S.J. said. "Pete, for your many years of dedication and your life of service to so many of us here on 84th Street for so long, thank you."

Labbat accepted the award during the Deo et Patriae Reception and Celebration, which recognizes all those who supported Regis at the Order of the Owl level during the previous fiscal year. The son of immigrant parents who left Egypt to escape anti-Christian discrimination, Labbat spoke passionately about the role his alma mater played in his formation.

"Regis delivers so much more than just a great academic education. It delivers a spiritual one designed to shape a young man's character so that he realizes his place in the world and his duty to others."

Labbat joined the Board of Trustees in 2005 and served two consecutive three-year terms. After a one-year hiatus, he returned to the Board in 2012 as Vice-Chairman and then led the Board as Chairman from 2013-2019. He oversaw the celebration of Regis' centennial and the search process that resulted in the hiring of Fr. Lahart as the school's 23rd president.

A graduate of Georgetown University and the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania, Labbat serves as managing partner at Energy Capital Partners, a private equity firm focused on investing in North America's energy infrastructure. He and his wife, Karen, live in Brooklyn with their two sons.

"Regis really shouldn't be giving me an award to say thank you," Labbat said. "For I can never say thank you enough to Regis for what I've received here."

Regis Ranked #1 Catholic High School



For the fifth consecutive year, Niche ranked Regis as the top Catholic high school in the United States. Niche is the largest website for researching K-12 schools in the country.

Regis earned its #1 ranking for 2020 by scoring highly on a variety of factors, including SAT/ACT scores, student-teacher ratio, the quality of colleges our students consider, and reviews from students and parents. While schools do not provide information directly to Niche, the company obtains statistical data from the U.S. Department of Education and then analyzes it to create their annual rankings.

Ignatian Spirituality The Fourth Day

In February, the Society of Jesus announced four new Universal Apostolic Preferences, priorities that will guide the work of Jesuits around the world for the next decade. This fall, Fr. Rizzo spoke to the Regis faculty about these preferences and how they can inform and shape the work done at Regis High School. A slightly condensed version of Fr. Rizzo's remarks follows.

The Universal Apostolic Preferences were released after a significant period of discernment involving Jesuit and lay colleagues, and they are meant to be lenses through which we view the work that Jesuit apostolates do throughout the world. They are:

- 1. To show the way to God through the Spiritual Exercises and discernment;
- 2. To walk with the poor, the outcasts of the world, those whose dignity has been violated, in a mission of reconciliation and justice;
- 3. To accompany young people in the creation of a hope-filled future;
- 4. To collaborate in the care of our Common Home.

I think it's helpful to consider these new Universal Apostolic Preferences not as a mere to-do list that we check off, but as openings to grace, where the real agent is God. The discernment process that led to these preferences has shown us where God's spirit is inviting the Society of Jesus – and Regis High School – to go.

These preferences offer us a lens through which we might see the interplay between our action and God's – what we do at Regis and how God is calling us to deepen our commitment to follow where God's Spirit might lead us. Jesuit Superior General Rev. Arthur Sosa's, SJ, concern about these preferences is that they

should point us, in ways that transcend considerations of programming and planning, to places where God's word can be heard, God's gift can be received, in particularly clear and challenging ways.

These preferences invite us as a school to go to places of vulnerability, places that might seem threatening: to the realities of the marginalized, in our community and beyond; of the young entrusted to our care who seek a hope filled future; to the challenges of climate change, and of counteracting the environmental destruction being caused. These preferences are about letting God change us and the work we do here at Regis.

Given the obvious relevance to Regis as an educational apostolate, let's focus on the third preference – to accompany young people in the creation of a hope-filled future. The Synod on Youth, which gathered last year, lays out The Road to Emmaus as the paradigm for working with young people today. Permit me to walk you through the movements of this familiar Gospel passage:

Iesus walks with two disciples who have not grasped the meaning of all that happened to him, and are leaving Jerusalem and the community behind. Wanting to accompany them, he joins them on the way. Initially, the disciples are unaware that this man is Jesus. He asks them questions and listens patiently to their version of events; he helps them recognize what they are experiencing. Then, with affection and power, he proclaims the word to them, bringing their experience into dialogue with the Gospel. He accepts the invitation to stay with them as evening falls. As they listen to him speak, their hearts burn within them and their minds open; they then recognize him in the breaking of bread. These two companions then choose to resume their journey at once in the opposite direction, to return to the community and to share the experience of their encounter with the Risen Lord.



It seems to me that this paradigm is rich for us as Catholic educators in the Jesuit tradition. As Jesus walks with the disciples, he listens to them. As professionals, experts in our fields, whose job it is to teach but also to accompany young people, there can be an urge to provide pre-packaged answers and readymade solutions, without allowing young people to live their questions, without allowing their real questions to emerge. If we do that before truly listening, we limit our ability to help them face the challenges those questions can pose. By really listening to the young people in our midst, by creating a listening culture in our school community, we communicate to our young men that their voices matter.

We can model for our young men the importance of listening in an age when it seems most people are just waiting for their turn to speak next, or where the noise of our digital universe severely inhibits our ability to truly listen to one another. Young people have much to teach us – they can help us to understand better the age in which we are living, and its hope-filled newness. But in order for us to be taught, we first have to listen – to our students, to their parents, and to each other.

Having listened, we can then facilitate an encounter for our young men – an encounter with the God of life, and with the truth of God's love for us. Youth, we are told in the universal apostolic preferences, is the stage of human life when individuals make the fundamental decisions by which they insert themselves into society, seek to give meaning to their existence, and realize their dreams. We want to be a part of that conversation with young people, in our parishes and in our schools, because we want to help them invite God into that conversation.

Making Time for Community

Community Time, a new addition to the updated Regis schedule, has created more opportunities to participate in a variety of extracurricular activities.

Long Island is better than New Jersey. Queens is far superior to Brooklyn.

These proclamations — and many others — were thrown around a Regis cafeteria table on a recent Wednesday morning during a spirited sandwich making session. Roughly 30 Regians, including members of each class, had gathered at 10:15 a.m. to make Sunny Jam Sandies. Catalyst, a student-run organization devoted to the Jesuit ideal of service, spearheads this monthly activity that makes sunflower butter and jelly sandwiches that get donated to New York Common Pantry, a Manhattan organization dedicated to feeding the hungry. The students usually construct roughly 200 sandwiches during each 45-minute session, and they're aiming to donate at least 2,500 by June.

A year earlier, these Regians would not have performed this service work in the middle of a normal class day. But thanks to the advent of Community Time, Catalyst and other clubs are now able to host meetings and organize activities during school hours, and busy Regis students can participate in more activities than they could in the past.

Community Time was introduced this fall as part of a broader update of Regis' schedule, which is now on an 8-day (A-H) rotation. From 10:15-11:00 a.m. on most school days, students are encouraged to take advantage of Community Time by going to a club meeting, attending Mass, or meeting with a teacher in a resource center.

"Community Time allows our students to have an even more well-rounded, diverse experience at Regis," Principal Fr. Anthony Andreassi, CO, said. "During dedicated school periods, students are able to hone leadership skills, participate in a new club, volunteer to help those in need, grow spiritually, or visit with a faculty member. This break comes after most students have completed two classes, so it can also



serve as an opportunity to just catch one's breath before usually two more classes and then lunch."

Erik Roll '20, one of the co-presidents of Catalyst, said the organization has already seen the benefits of Community Time. Once a week, the club hosts a service project at 10:15 a.m. in the cafeteria, rotating between Sunny Jam Sandies and the Patriot Project, which involves students cutting stars from decommissioned American flags to send to veterans and service members. Participation in these activities has increased since last year, Roll said, as a much larger group of students, many of whom can't attend after school because of sports practices and other responsibilities, are now able to join.

"It's really a helpful way for students to get involved in events that they want to get involved in but they wouldn't be able to if they held it after school," Roll said. "It's more flexible, and it's also much more inclusive."

While Catalyst, one of Regis' more popular activities, has taken advantage of

Community Time, it also has been a boon for less thriving clubs. Francis Barth '20, the president of the Foreign Affairs Club, said Community Time has invigorated the sometimes attendance-challenged group.

"Between my freshman and junior years, there were really only a few meetings during the first trimester until the president would give up given the poor turnout," Barth said. "So far this year, every meeting has had at least 15 members engaging in topics ranging from the recent Israeli elections to the Turkish treatment of the Kurds. Fortunately, it appears that the club will continue throughout the school year."

Each morning, students have no shortage of options when Community Time arrives. At the same time the students prepared Summer Jam Sandies on that Wednesday this fall, Fr. Arthur Bender, S.J., '67 celebrated Mass in the Regis Chapel of the Sacred Heart, the Glee Club held a rehearsal on the fourth floor, Regis ECO met to discuss the ecological impact of recent California wildfires, and two sophomore advisement groups squared off in an intramural soccer game.

Community Time also allows Roll, Barth, and the rest of the student body to sharpen their leadership skills and enhance their time management and prioritization abilities. "This is time that we're setting aside for students to create as their time and space," Assistant Principal for Student Life Christian Mariano '99 said. "I don't dictate to anyone: You've got to do this; you've got to do this."

Barth, who also serves as Student Government President, said that, "Regians being Regians," there was some initial skepticism among the student body. But after just a few months, it's clear that Community Time — like debates about the superiority of one borough over another — is here to stay at Regis.





Summer Renovations

Two of Regis' most commonly used spaces received much-needed upgrades before the start of the 2019-2020 academic year.

When Regians arrived in September for the start of 2019-2020 academic year, two of the most commonly used spaces in the school looked quite different. Each summer, with students and faculty mostly absent, work is done at Regis to maintain our historic building and enhance spaces for our students. This year, among other projects, the Locker Room and the 5th floor Lecture Hall were completely renovated.

The generosity of the Regis family made both updates possible. Each year at the annual Parents' Club Auction, a new Auction Challenge is unveiled, identifying an important project or two for the school to undertake and asking the attendees for their support. The assembled Regis parents, alumni parents, and members of the Regis community responded by contributing more than \$220,000 to support these two 2019 initiatives.

"Once again, our Auction Challenge donors rose to the occasion to provide us with the funds to make these much-needed improvements," Regis President Fr. Daniel K. Lahart, SJ, said. "Generations of Regis students will benefit from their remarkable generosity."

All those who donated to the Auction Challenge were invited to attend the official unveiling of the renovations on September 18. At the reception, Fr. Lahart expressed his gratitude and blessed the spaces.

"We dedicate these new spaces as part of our education of the youth to the progress of science and learning and healthy mind and body," he prayed. "May these spaces within this building continue to center our students and our teachers, and help to imbue them with words of truth and search for wisdom and God's Christian life, and we strive wholeheartedly to stand by Christ our teacher, He who lives and reigns forever and ever."

In the Locker Room, the construction team removed all existing lockers and installed 550 new, two-tiered lockers on new cinderblock bases, creating built-in benches on which students can sit. The gray lockers are surrounded by red borders, giving the Locker Room a more distinctly Regis feel. A new floor and new overhead lighting helps create a more welcoming environment for Regians.

The Lecture Hall, commonly referred to as the Physics Lecture Hall in the past, also received a complete revamping. The classic desks were removed and replaced by 160 theater-style red seats. (Regis made the removed desks available for purchase, and nostalgic alumni and parents jumped at the chance to own a piece of school history, purchasing them all.) The old chalkboards made way for modern whiteboards, and a new audiovisual system was installed. The updated room is more versatile and comfortable for the many classes held inside it each day, and it now serves as another wonderful location to host Regis events.

The Locker Room and Lecture Hall weren't the only rooms in the building to get a makeover this summer. In May, a small electrical fire broke out in the Science Research Project Room. Thanks to the work of the New York City Fire Department, no one was injured and the damage remained relatively contained, but it needed to be completely gutted and refurbished. The room directly below it sustained water damage, and as part of the necessary cleanup, new whiteboards and an updated audiovisual system were installed.

"Regis is blessed with a beautiful landmark building," Fr. Lahart said. "As we care for it and make needed enhancements, we remain so very grateful for all those who make these updates — and all that we do here on 84th Street — possible."




Reunion Recap

Our classmate George Lardner died on Sept. 21; prayerful condolences to his family. The ace Owl reporter and honor card guru we fondly remember became a celebrated journalist who won a Pulitzer Prize for his investigative reporting of the murder of his daughter. From the New York Times obituary: "Mr. Lardner distinguished himself over nearly 30 years at the Washington Post, writing about assassinations, civil rights, savings-and-loan scandals, politics, and national security... maintaining a reputation for dogged investigative reporting and elegant writing." Mark Mazzetti '92 (Times chief D.C. investigative

correspondent) salutes a brother Regian and expresses his personal "high regard for the great legacy" of George's life and achievements as a fellow journalist. In response to a note about dismissed classmates in our last Prowlings, George Culliney '54 writes: "I read about two good men in your class who didn't make it to graduation. I remember another: Jim Connell, who had to leave at the end of junior year, after flunking German, though Mr. Vogel told Jim he would've passed him had he known he was on probation. Jim was two years ahead of me at St. Brendan's School and at Regis, as were John (Red) Amabile and Bob Kleffmann. Jim was one of the finest guys I ever met, brilliant in math. He recruited me to join him in Army National Guard. A Master Sgt., his math skills served us well. I was with him 1954-60. He went to Hayes and St. John's after Regis." Bob Kleffmann replies: "George, What a blast from the past! Iim Connell and I were good friends at Regis; I frequently went to his house to study, taking pills occasionally to stay awake. Jim had a photographic memory which earned him A's in most subjects except for those he had no interest in and did not study, which is why he flunked out. We stayed in touch during college but lost touch when I moved to Connecticut. Another alumnus from our class at St. Brendan's besides John Amabile (who, I understand, no longer goes by "Red"), Jim, and myself was Martin Feeley. He also didn't make it through. I don't know what happened to him." John Amabile replies: "George, You sure know how to revive old memories! Yes, I was part of the SBS reprobates who used to enjoy a few beers at McChesney's, along with Dave LaBelle '51, SBS '47, Regis '51, and his classmate in both schools, Jim O'Rourke '51. Both were close friends, but over the years I lost track of Dave. (I do remember, however, that upon my daughter's graduation from college, Dave

facilitated her first job.) Not so

with Jim. After serving in the Navy, Jim entered Holy Cross in the class of '56, which was my year also. In fact, we roomed together in our senior year and remain close friends.
